

Animal Assisted Therapy


- Involve using specially trained animals as catalysts
- Animal assist in facilitating the therapeutic or learning process
- It is not a substitute form of therapy

Therapy Dogs

Therapy dogs are trained for social interaction. Their purpose is to provide comfort, stress relief, and psychological and physiological therapy to individuals other than their handlers.

Function

- Functions of a therapy dog are to be petted by others to relieve stress, promote physical or emotional well being
- They can assist during therapy to help an individual meet specific goals
- Therapy dog and their handlers typically work as a team for short periods of time (i.e., 1 to 2 hours) during a preplanned visit

Requirements

All dogs **must** be certified therapy dogs Passed evaluation or equivalent screening

- Current on all shots, including rabies
- Well groomed and clean

Specialized Dog Skills

- Comfortable with children
- At ease with crowds, noise, petting, and hugs
- Reliable in novel situations
- Able to lie or sit quietly with a child for long periods

Handler Responsibilities

Providing appropriate equipment

Properly identifying therapy dog and themselves

Program Development

- Gaining Permission
 - Consult with administration
 - Consider willingness of a school to accept animals
 - Be prepared to address legal and liability issues
- Consider funding sources such grants if materials are needed
- Secure administrative and faculty support
 - Positive teacher attitude toward program is important for success

- Contacts Letters and phone contact Securing permission
- Permission slips and photo releases


Note


